What is assistive technology?

Assistive technology can eliminate barriers to education and enhance access to information. It enables users who may be blind or vision impaired to read course material, conduct research and secure employment.

Assistive technology is software and hardware that enables people who are blind or have low vision to access reading material in a format of their choice, whether this is audio, large print, braille or electronic information.

This technology is essential for accessing computer software in areas such as word processing, spreadsheets and presentations. It also enables access to the internet and email applications, as well as note-taking in class. These assistive technologies include computers with speech output, electronic braille displays and devices for electronically scanning printed material.
